Organization Description:

Community Child Care Council (4C's) of Alameda County is a private non-profit agency that has been offering services to families, children and child care providers since 1972.

Through a contract with the California Department of Education, 4C's provides child care resource and referral services in southern Alameda County. Families receive free child care referrals, information about choosing child care and parenting support services. Child care providers receive technical assistance, resources and training.

4C's also provides child care payment services for CalWORKs participants, foster parents and families needing respite care in southern Alameda County. We host the Southern Alameda County Chapter of Parents Voices. Our Child Health and Nutrition Program serves child care providers throughout Alameda County by providing meal reimbursements and health and nutrition education. In Oakland, 4C's provides child care payment services and operates Bright Future Learning Center serving children 2 months to 5 years of age.

Additional resources include our website, quarterly newsletter, and tip sheets for parents and providers. Our staff members speak multiple languages and services are provided in the client's preferred language whenever possible. In addition, we collect and publish data on local child care capacity and needs to help communities plan for child care.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

Our project is a parent education and support program for Spanish-speaking families in Hayward, San Lorenzo, and San Leandro. The program includes parenting classes, child enrichment activities, and family read nights. The Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ) will be offered to families. We provide dinner and child care to help families attend.

Organization Description:

Abode Services believes everyone should have a home. Every day we provide housing and services to homeless people in our community as we work to end the cycle of homelessness.

In the 2012 financial year, we helped to improve the lives of more than 4,300 people, including 1,400 children, across our programs, offering services in three main areas: emergency shelter and crisis support services at Sunrise Village and the HOPE Project Mobile Health Clinic; subsidized housing at six affordable housing communities and hundreds of scattered-site apartments throughout Alameda and Santa Clara Counties; and supportive services, such as mental health services, financial literacy training, and employment support, to help people remain stably housed and live as independently as possible.

These programs have helped to save our community potentially millions of dollars a year that would otherwise have been spent in more costly alternatives to cope with local homelessness, including hospitals and the criminal justice system. They also help bridge the gap to affordable housing in the costly Bay Area rental market for hundreds of families, supporting them in attaining long-term stability and better health and educational outcomes for their children.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

Helping the homeless and formerly homeless parents in our Children's Program build the confidence and knowledge they need to support their children's healthy development. This program will provide respite, skill-building, and counseling to parents, while also supporting children with services and enrichment.

Organization Description:

The mission of the Alameda County Library is to provide and protect access to books, information, and library services to promote learning, cultural enrichment and appreciation and enjoyment for everyone.

Library services are provided in the cities of Albany, Dublin, Fremont, Newark, and Union City, and the unincorporated communities of San Lorenzo and Castro Valley. Every year the library serves a diverse community of over 500,000. Additional community based services are provided through Extension Services in the Bookmobile, Write to Read Literacy, Senior Outreach Programs, Juvenile Hall, Camp Wilmont Sweeney, and the County jails. The library is also starting "pop-up" library services at the Family Justice Center and the Department of Child Support Services. Over 146,000 people attended programs last year, and the library circulated over 5 million items.

The Newark and Union City libraries are both community libraries, with many patrons who use the facility multiple times per week. Both libraries provide weekly story times for English speaking children as well as Homework Centers during the week for K-12 students. All programs available to the public are free. The library partners with many local agencies, and children's staff does outreach to Kidango, Head Start, and the school district.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

"Read Play Succeed" or "Lea, Juegue y Avance!" is a Spanish-language story time and playgroup hour designed to enhance school readiness for Latino children and encourage literacy activities in the home, while situating the Newark and Union City libraries as early literacy hubs in their communities.

Organization Description:

Alta Bates Summit Medical Center is a community-based nonprofit hospital providing comprehensive healthcare services to the East Bay's diverse communities. The Alta Bates Summit Medical Center NICU serves a similarly diverse population of families and fragile infants from within Alameda County and beyond.

We strive to accommodate the various needs of families, which range from those who are here for less than a week for a term infant requiring minimal support, to those who are here for months for infants requiring maximal technological interventions to sustain life. Families face stress and anxiety due to the uncertain nature of caring for a medically fragile baby. Our proposed programming provides support to families and babies, so they can move beyond their NICU experience and address identified delays as early as possible.

7,371 babies were delivered at Alta Bates in 2012, making Alta Bates Summit Medical Center the largest birthing center in Northern California. Due to this volume, the NICU has a corresponding high volume. NICU admissions in 2012 were over 1,100 (60 percent of which were premature babies) making the NICU one of the largest in Northern California.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

The project will maximize efforts to increase parent knowledge/abilities in the areas of healthy child development, parental coping skills/self-care, and access to timely interim and long-term early intervention services. Our team will deepen engagement of families, while offering social/emotional support to enhance the well-being of parents.

Organization Description:

Asian Community Mental Health Services, a private non-profit agency, was established in 1974 and has since pioneered a community mental health approach with a diverse Asian/Pacific Islander population that is consumer-need driven and community-based.

Asian Community Mental Health Services' mission is to provide and advocate for multilingual and multicultural services, empowering the most vulnerable members of our community to lead healthy, contributing, and self-sufficient lives.

Today Asian Community Mental Health Services' staff of over 100 provide wraparound services in 10 Asian languages and dialects: Cambodian, Cantonese, English, Japanese, Korean, Laotian, Mandarin, Mien, Tagalog, and Vietnamese.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

A 16 week cycle involving jointly conducted parenting peer support and education groups and developmental playgroups for 90 underserved Chinese and Vietnamese immigrant parents/caretakers with 90 of their children ages 0-5 conducted in their primary language.

Organization Description:

Asian Health Services is a federally qualified health center that provides comprehensive culturally and linguistically competent health care to low-income, uninsured, and underinsured Asian and Pacific Islander communities across Alameda County. Asian Health Services started in 1974 as a one-room clinic in Alameda County's Oakland Chinatown staffed completely by student volunteers. Today, Asian Health Services provides over 104,000 medical and dental visits to over 24,000 patients annually and is a nationally recognized comprehensive community health center model for serving a primarily low-income, limited English proficient population.

Asian Health Services provides a full spectrum of culturally and linguistically competent health care services from primary care to dental services for all ages; perinatal services; reproductive health; preventive care services; health education; nutrition counseling; chronic disease management; behavioral health services; senior health care; end-of-life care; HIV prevention and testing; ancillary services such as ultrasounds and x-rays; and eligibility counseling.

Given that Asian Health Services provides health services and education to over 500 pregnant women and new mothers each year, Asian Health Services is in a strong position to seamlessly integrate linguistically and culturally appropriate parenting education and social support opportunities that will enable Asian and Pacific Islander women and their families to better support their child's development.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

Asian Health Services' Perinatal Empowerment Program enhances parenting support for low-income Asian and Pacific Islander pregnant women and families to better able support their child's development. The Perinatal Empowerment Program provides a continuum of care from pregnancy to parenting through linguistically and culturally appropriate prenatal classes, labor coach support, and parenting workshops.

Organization Description:

BANANAS is a child care resource referral agency located in Oakland, committed to serving families and child care providers in Northern Alameda County. As one of the first such services in the United States, we have assisted families in accessing and using child care for the past forty years. We provide education and support to parents and child care providers through free workshops, classes and support groups on a variety of topics. Additionally, we administer nine alternative payment programs to help low-income families receive financial support for the cost of child care.

We have published over 100 handouts and a newsletter, which is sent out to over 10,000 parents and caregivers, and have an extensive resource lending library of books, periodicals, articles and videos on child rearing, child development and child-related issues.

We work with local community colleges and other training groups to offer Early Childhood Education classes for licensed and license-exempt child care providers. Additionally, we offer free clothing, equipment, toys, diapers, and furniture for infants and children of low-income families, which other parents and supporters have donated. In short, we are a one-stop resource for anyone raising or caring for children in Northern Alameda County.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

Assisting parents in supporting their child's development through multiple, free support groups and classes, offered year-round at BANANAS in English, Spanish, Chinese and Vietnamese. Conducting parenting classes in licensed family child care programs serving low-income families, including those receiving subsidies.

Organization Description:

The Bay Area Hispano Institute for Advancement Inc. was founded in 1975 to provide bilingual care and education to low income parents in Alameda County with a particular focus on Latino families.

Centro VIDA, our flagship program provides full time care services to children ages 2-5. Bahia School Age Program serves children ages 5-10 years of age part time during the school year and full time during the summer. La Academia de Bahia is a part time three-hour morning bilingual pre-kindergarten readiness program for 3-4 year olds. The three programs are located in Berkeley. La Academia de Centro VIDA is a successful bilingual Saturday pre-kindergarten readiness program for 40 children ages 3-5 years located in Fremont. Bay Area Hispano Institute for Advancement is the only Latino non-profit organization with a focus on bilingual early to school-age care and education in the county.

Bay Area Hispano Institute for Advancement is known for engaging with partners to address the achievement gap, and actively participating on many levels to address the disparities in education that have roots in the early years. The unique strengths of Bay Area Hispano Institute for Advancement's programs are placing value on the important relationship between language, culture, and learning.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

Conducting parenting classes in Spanish in concert with a part-time quality bilingual preschool program (school readiness) in Fremont for children 3 to 5 years on Saturday morning. Outreach will be focused on families in Southern Alameda County who are low income, Latino, and Spanish speaking.

Organization Description:

Bay Area Parent Leadership Action Network (PLAN) works to empower parents to transform schools. Parent Leadership Action Network believes that every child deserves an excellent education and that parents play a key role. Through training and leadership development, Parent Leadership Action Network provides parents with the skills, knowledge and confidence to be a leader in their child's education. We envision transforming systems so that all children enter school ready to learn and graduate from high school as caring, competent critical thinkers who are ready for college, career, community, and life.

Parent Leadership Action Network's primary strategies include parent leadership training; parent organizing and empowerment; and technical assistance to schools, family resource centers, and early childhood providers. Each year, more than 400 parents and guardians participate in our programs, including the PLAN to LEAD Training of Trainers program and Parents Ready for School.

In 2007 Parent Leadership Action Network developed the Parents Ready for School curriculum and program. More than 600 families have gone through the program to date. In 2011, Parent Leadership Action Network added a "Training of Trainers" component to expand delivery of the program and improved the curriculum model by adding a seventh workshop promoting regular attendance.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

Bay Area Parent Leadership Action Network will promote school readiness in Alameda County by providing Parents Ready for School trainings to increase the ability of low-income parents to support their children's transition to and success in public schools, and teaching 0-5 providers to train other families using this curriculum.

Organization Description:

CALICO achieves justice and healing for abused children. We achieve justice by bringing together law enforcement officers, child welfare workers, prosecutors, and other professionals to investigate abuse allegations and elicit testimony from children. We use a nationally proven method designed to attain thorough and accurate information while protecting the emotional needs of the victim. We promote healing for victims by coordinating the first and most crucial stages of recovery. Our skilled mental-health clinicians offer guidance, resources and support to help the entire family along the path to physical and mental health and well-being.

CALICO's mission is to provide a supportive environment to interview children and facilitate a collaborative response to child abuse in which the needs of children take precedence. In 2012, we aided over 700 victims and their caregivers, including 117 abused children who were under five years of age and another 123 families with children under 5 residing in the household. Most of the young victims were sexually abused, and many were physically hurt, neglected, exploited as prostitutes, living in homes where drugs were manufactured, sold or used, and/or witnessed violence in their homes or communities.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

Providing mental-health interventions to families in crisis and at-risk of child maltreatment. We aim to aid 200 caregivers of abused children ages 0-5 through onsite and follow-up support, and 100 caregivers of children at-risk of maltreatment.

Organization Description:

The Center for Early Intervention on Deafness is a 33 year old nonprofit organization serving children, 0-5, who are deaf or hard of hearing and/or have severe speech and language delays. The Center for Early Intervention on Deafness provides educational programs, family navigation, and resource supports for families to maximize the development of language (oral and/or sign) and communication potential of their children.

The Center for Early Intervention on Deafness has been recognized as an "exemplary" program by the State of California since 1981. Children 18 months or younger receive home visits by Early Intervention Specialists. Children 18 months through age 5 participate in toddler and preschool classes at the Center for Early Intervention on Deafness' community based Berkeley Center led by credentialed Teachers of the Deaf using sign language and spoken language simultaneously. Many Center for Early Intervention on Deafness students are medically fragile or have additional significant disabilities.

Kindergarten readiness is a focus of the Center for Early Intervention on Deafness' services and family involvement is necessary and central to the Center for Early Intervention on Deafness' service paradigm. Parents are encouraged to participate in classes and activities with their children and to attend free sign language classes, and, morning, evening, and weekend educational/resource presentations. The Center for Early Intervention on Deafness' facility includes a digital Parent Library that is a gathering place for informal parent groups and for formal parent trainings.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

This project establishes community and center-based developmental playgroups and enhanced family support activities not currently available. Families with children who are deaf or hard of hearing must learn unique strategies to help their children acquire language and develop cognitively, emotionally, and academically.

Organization Description:

Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland is the oldest and largest children's hospital between LA and Seattle and the sole safety net children's hospital in Alameda County. In addition to providing the traditional functions of a hospital, Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland maintains an array of services for children in Alameda County, from primary care and mental health to highly specialized treatment for rare diseases, making it a hub of the local health prevention and social services landscape.

MediCal reimbursement for medical and mental health services for children is extremely poor and there are few providers in the area willing to see children with public insurance. On the other hand, Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland serves all children regardless of ability to pay.

Over 70,000 children visit Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland annually, about half of whom are under age 5, giving Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland perhaps more influence over the well being of local children than any other direct service provider.

The Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland Primary Care Clinic, located two blocks from the main hospital, is the largest primary care clinic in the Bay Area with 30,000 patient-visits per year. It is a designated federally qualified health center; approximately 98% of the children who come to the clinic have MediCal.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

Enabling the International Clinic to enhance its language and cultural capacity through the hiring of a Patient Advocate who is a linguistically and cultural match to its Arabicspeaking families with young children in order to increase early identification and linkages to supports for development.

Organization Description:

Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland is a comprehensive non-profit medical center established in 1912 whose mission is to provide quality health care, research, and training. Seventy percent of the children seen by the hospital have Medi-Cal insurance, indicating that a high percentage of children served are living in poverty.

The Early Intervention Services Unit, a part of Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland, began with only two programs 33 years ago. The Early Intervention Services Unit now has over 10 different programs and an operating budget of approximately \$7,000,000. The Early Intervention Services staff is multidisciplinary and includes early childhood special educators, infant development specialists, physical therapists, speech therapists, early childhood mental health specialists, and nurses. All staff are grounded in a relationship-based approach in working with young children and families who are at risk due to a combination of environmental and biological risk factors.

The Early Intervention Services Unit staff hold particular expertise in the integration of developmental and mental health approaches in both assessment and treatment and are highly skilled at working with young children who have, or are at high risk for, developmental, and social/emotional delays. Early Intervention Services operates as a part of Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland but is entirely supported by grants and contracts.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

The Integrated Developmental Playgroup Program continues a successful model of parent-child support for Spanish speaking families (predominantly monolingual) living in economically challenged South Hayward. These children (18 months- 4 year olds) have developmental/social-emotional challenges and are not receiving other socialization or early care and education services.

Organization Description:

Youth and Family Services, a division of the City of Fremont's Human Services Department, has provided family-focused mental health services to children for 40 years. In 2011-12, Youth and Family Services served over 1200 children and families, including 61 preschool age children at its counseling offices located at the Fremont Family Resource Center, at 21 Fremont and Newark schools, and at the Fremont Police Department. Youth and Family Services provided parent education classes to approximately 250 parents, including 110 parents of preschool age children through the Preschool Parent Academy, a partnership with Fremont Unified School District.

The City of Fremont's Human Service Department enhances the quality of life in the community by leveraging partnerships and providing direct services across the life span through Youth and Family Services, the Family Resource Center and Aging and Family Services Divisions. As a result, Youth and Family Services is able to link families to a wide range of needed resources.

These "wardrobes-in-a-box" each contain 75 garments in sizes 0-12 months, enough clothing to keep a baby warm and clean through the first year. All of the wardrobes-in-a-box are given directly to families through licensed social workers at hospitals, safe houses, clinics, and homeless shelters.

Loved Twice serves at-risk babies of mothers experiencing extreme challenges, including homelessness, poverty, violence, and teen pregnancy. Loved Twice helps meet a basic need for disadvantaged newborns and helps reduce the new parents' stress, which allows them to better care for their baby in the long-term. Since 2005, Loved Twice has clothed 7,050 newborns, helping vulnerable families meet their basic needs while keeping over 70,000 pounds of clothing out of landfills. That's 528,750 essential garments recycled into underserved communities with an estimated retail value of \$1,586,250! Loved Twice is based in Alameda County, and 30% of all babies served are in Alameda County.

Description of First 5 Alameda County funded services:

Loved Twice will provide a year's worth of gently used clothes to 1,600 Alameda County underprivileged newborns. Each baby will receive a "wardrobe-in-a-box" with 75 essential items. Loved Twice partners with social workers at hospitals, shelters, prenatal clinics, and safe homes to distribute wardrobes-in-a-box to those with the greatest need.

Using an affiliate model, Raising A Reader is implemented in 29 states, in over 146 communities, and currently serves over 110,000 young children and their families.

Tri-Valley Haven is in its 36th year of service, having begun operating a crisis line and shelter out of a Board member's home in 1977. Since then services have greatly expanded. We now include providing domestic violence, homeless, and sexual assault services. Domestic violence services include 24-hour crisis line; Shiloh, a 30-bed confidential shelter; individual and group counseling; restraining order assistance; and community outreach and education.

Our Rape Crisis Center opened in 1981 and offers sexual assault services to residents of the Tri-Valley area. These services include crisis response, advocacy, individual counseling, support groups, community outreach, and education.

Haven homeless services began in 2002 and currently include Sojourner House, a homeless shelter, and a food pantry. Sojourner House is the only shelter in the area that will accept single dads and teen boys. Life Skills groups offered at Sojourner House make the program a huge success since they equip our clients with skills that they have never had before, and are critical for returning or entering the life without homelessness.

The Haven offers several other support services to its clients to provide a more comprehensive approach towards healing and self-sufficiency.

Parents-Creating-Change program will provide parenting classes for parents of children ages 0 to 5 at our Domestic Violence and Homeless Shelters and individual sessions for the community. Classes will include topics on nutrition, scheduling and the importance of play, the dangers of secondhand smoke, children's development, and creating/maintaining healthy boundaries.
